Australia Day Clinker Boat Race Rules 2024.

- 1. Boat Captain's Briefing Meeting at 9 a.m. sharp. (All Skippers must attend).
- 2. All Boats must be in the water by 9.45 a.m. for a 10 a.m. start.
- 3. The Start Line will be an imaginary line between the end of the pier and the Start Boat.
- 4. A two-minute start warning horn, (2 blasts), will sound exactly two minutes before the start to enable all boats to line-up on the start line.
- 5 When all boats are in line, or close to it, the race will start with one blast from the horn.
- 6. All Boats are to race towards Port Melbourne, passing around the positioned motor boat and head back towards the Club, (from the deep side to the beach side).
- 7. The winners will be judged as the first boats to round the 200 meter Yellow marker on their way back to the Club, as judged by the Start Boat.

Disqualifications may be incurred by boats jumping the start or not going around the designated markers.

We'll be able to get up-to-date footage, not only of *Margaret's Reef*, but also those well-known fishing areas, such as the elusive '*Inner Wreck*'. This drone far exceeds the one that we were looking at purchasing, so we're completely chuffed.

Recently **Nina Taylor** (State Labour MP for Albert Park) paid us a visit; she was extremely happy to announce that APYAC had been awarded a \$10,000 Fishing Club development grant.

These funds have already been put to fantastic use - all of the Club's hire Boats and Kayaks have now been fitted with fishing sounders, enabling club members not only to use GPS technology, but also to see reefs, the sea bottom, and any fish beneath them. Port to Park Open Water Swim - Saturday 3 February.

On Saturday 3 February, the *Port to Park Open Water Swim*, an annual swimming event, will be run by our neighbours at the South Melbourne Life Saving Club.

There are two events, a 1.1 km swim, and a 2.2 km swim.

The 1.1 km swim starts at Lagoon Pier, Port Melbourne and finishes next to APYAC. The 2.2 km swim both starts and finishes at Kerfed Pier. Approximately 300 participants are expected.

As the swimmers will be near our gantry at various times between 9.00 and 11.00 a.m., boat owners need to take this into account if they are planning to launch or retrieve their boats from our club that morning.

Safety Gear.

All boaters check your safety gear prior to going on the water, make sure you are aware of weather forecasts, make sure your crew knows where the safety gear is, and —if in doubt— err on the safe options. You may as well check your flares and life jacket expiry dates, make sure your torch works, and your registration certificate is correctly displayed. The Water Police are out and about.

Ask for help.

Anyone using power or sharp tools in the boathouse, if you have not used the tool previously, or feel you are not competent in its use, ask for help. There are items in the Boat House that can seriously bite you, better to ask for help than suffer a trip to the quack's ... or worse.

How do you prefer your oysters: Natural, Kilpatrick or Extinct?



Abundant oyster reefs once surrounded the southern half of Australia from Noosa to Perth but, decades of overexploitation, sedimentation and disease have all but wiped them out.

Over 90% of our natural oyster reefs have been lost.

And the consequences go way beyond your seafood platter.

Oyster reefs can transform the waters around them by providing clean water, homes for over 100 marine species, as well as food. By working in collaboration with different partners around Australia, we're rebuilding our lost reefs and bringing this ecosystem back from the brink of extinction.

Angling Report.

The weather has been unkind especially the north end of the Bay. Late in December the water was clear, the whiting were biting and snapper were being caught, but only in deeper waters and not in large numbers. Then the big rain arrived and the water became very dirty. Whiting went off the bite, along with squid up the north. Pinkies still biting but large numbers undersize. Flathead are in large numbers now and always easy to catch.

Water temp is between 20 C and 22 C —good for Whiting, Squid and Flatties. Snapper, we believe, headed to the deeper cooler water. However, the warmer water also means sharks and snook are around, both can be fun to catch.

The southern end of the Bay has been fishing well in the cleaner water, it appears the water does not need to be crystal clear but squid, whiting, snapper and gummies have been caught in good numbers. Worth a trip but check the weather before you venture long distances by water. Don't be too proud to pull into the shore if the weather deteriorates ... better to be on shore wishing you were at sea, than being at sea and wishing you were on shore!

The Tiger Lyons Whiting Comp is coming up on the weekend 10th and 11th of February. We hope the normal marks around the club are producing fish by then and the ravenous pinkies take a holiday and give the whiting a go at baits.

We would love some pics of any memorable fish you have caught over the Christmas break.

Plenty of Pippies, Couta and Tommy Roughs in the bait fridge. Fresh mussels can be bought at Coles or Costco or South Melbourne Market. Frozen Pippies are expensive from our bait supplier so suggest you try other bait suppliers but we will try to stock Pippies in the next week or so.

A reminder please remove bait from the vertical Freezer.

Protecting pedestrians crossing Beaconsfield Parade - Petition.



Local **Pippa Binfield** is concerned that locals, families, kids and beachgoers are at risk of being hit by cars every time they cross Beaconsfield Parade from Kerferd Road (city side) at the designated pedestrian lights.

She believes that inadequate time is allowed for pedestrians to walk across the six lane road before right turning traffic from Kerferd Road is given the green arrow.

Inadequate signage to warn turning-drivers of pedestrians crossing contributes to a potential tragedy.

The problem can be fixed with only a small change by the responsible government agencies. In the past residents have alerted the Council only to be told 'It's a Vicroads issue'.

Seafood Positive.

APYAC Kitchen are proud to partner with *Seafood Positive* and their new sustainable seafood program, **OneFishTwoFish**.

The program aims to help replenish fish and marine life in Port Phillip by applying a 'circular economy approach' to seafood. 25c from every seafood meal from the kitchen is donated to local fish habitat projects such as oyster reef restoration. The program was created by **Dr Chris Gillies** (formally Ocean Director at The Nature Conservancy) as a way for restaurants and seafood lovers across Melbourne to easily give back to the oceans without giving up their love of seafood.

Dr Gillies said "This program is all about making sure there is more fish in the future for everyone. For half the cost of a postage stamp, seafood lovers can help rebuild important fish habitats such as shellfish reefs, kelp forests and seagrass meadows which are the engine rooms of our coastal fisheries. If just a fraction of Melbourne's 3500 restaurants followed APYAC lead and joined the program, then we would literally raise hundreds of thousands of dollars each year to support local marine restoration projects independent of government".

Members have welcomed the new initiative and look forward to learning more about the restoration projects supported by OneFishTwoFish.
