



Flathead Frenzy.

- Alex Spyrou won the Flathead Frenzy with a 47cm fish
- **Cameron McPerson** swabbed the most flathead for the competition, 8 fish.

There are plenty of flathead swabs left after the Frenzy for you to take out after the competition. Swabs are in the Langdon Room

and downstairs near the sign out book. Swabs are to be returned to the esky in the boat house, near the sign-out desk. Swab as many flathead as you can, this is a great time to catch flathead.

We believe the best rig for catching flathead is the paternoster rig, sinker at the end of your line with one or two droppers above the sinker. Start with a 4/0 or 5/0 hooks. Cut pilchards, squid or filets of any fish great bait, they will also take soft

plastic lures. Drift over sandy areas from Black Rock to Port Melbourne. Once you catch a few go back over the area as flathead do tend to school up in waves on the bottom. Out the back of the club 100 metres out from the end of the pier can be productive. Rug-up, the flathead are waiting for you!

Charter volunteers.

We would like all charter anglers, and those wanting to join-in next season, to volunteer for door or raffle duty at the Club. Give Admin a call on 9690 5530. If we do not get volunteers for door, or raffle duty the Club may not be so generous paying half the charter fee.

Bait.

Anglers who buy bait from the club, and book it to your fob, please be sure there are funds on your fob to cover the cost of bait. We are getting more and more bait buyers who do not have enough money on their fobs. The Club is not a bank. Please fix this we do not want to have to name and shame anglers. If you think you are out of credit call Elise to top-up at the Club.

Reports.

The weather has been great for boaters and anglers mostly in the early mornings, it has been blowing-up (or not) in the afternoons. The Bay water temperatures have dropped since the last edition (15.2C top end of the Bay, 15.6C Mid Bay, Ocean 16.3C). The lack of rain has meant that the water in the Bay has been clearer than we have seen for ages.

The second run of snapper has been very patchy, and fish few and far between the last few weeks. Snapper are still around just very hard to find. Best baits seem to be Silver Whiting, Australian Salmon Fillets, Pilchards, Garfish and Squid.

Whiting have mostly been missing from the usual marks around the Club and reports are not great, they seem to be biting around Point Cook near the sanctuary, and south of there, including Kirks Point. Fish grassy areas 2-5 metres deep. Keep moving if you are not catching them. Best baits, Pipis, mussels and squid strips.

Squid are being caught in large numbers but in the Avalon, Kirks Point and Campbells Cove areas. Gummy Sharks are lurking around P2 and Werribee in deeper water. Keep an eye out for birds working as there are still very large schools of Australian Salmon up the Club end of the bay. Many good salmon caught around the red stick near Altona, a large school in that area. Any smallish slivery or pilchard looking lure dragged through or cast into the area the birds are diving in should produce fish. The areas around the Warmies also firing up, look for steam coming out of the chimney, and give the area a go.

Garfish plentiful in the bay so if you see them a light rod with a quill or similar float a small hook with Silverfish (very small almost clear fish about 1-2 cm long) Prawn slivers or bread dough works.

Give it a go but watch the weather, rug up to keep warm and take care!

Pier closed for repairs.

Upcoming safety repairs to Kerferd Road Pier

"We need to repair Kerferd Road Pier so it continues to be safe for the local community and visitors to enjoy.

One pile is in poor condition and needs replacing.

The end 40 metre section of the pier, including the lower landing, will be temporarily closed to the public for up to one week during May --subject to favourable weather conditions.

Pier-based fishing, and boat access will be available at nearby Lagoon Pier."

Kayakers Reef fisheries survey.



Ben Cleveland and **Brent Womersley** recently dived on *Kayakers Reef* for the first time since the oyster triangle deployment in December. They were surprised by the rapid growth, and coverage, of seeded oysters (*Ostrea angasi*) on the triangles. Many oysters have also settled-on and are growing-well on the unseeded Fish Towers.

Some of the oyster triangles, especially in the southern part of the reef, have partly subsided into the sediment, however overall, the modules are sitting well.

The second phase of the reef steered by APYAC and *Cardium Marine* was recently installed, west of the original reef. During the dives it was a good opportunity for Ben to assess that this installation was completed as planned. The contrasting growth of marine life on the original modules is phenomenal in only five months —so advanced that it is difficult to distinguish the original shapes of the oyster triangles.

Tandem Kayak

The two-person kayak, generously donated by Tiger Yan earlier this year, has had a lifting-sling fitted and seats attached to the hull, and as such will soon be made available for hire. It currently lives in the centre aisle on the top shelf and can be lifted using the electric crane, noting that it is slightly bow-heavy so should be supported as it is raised. Unlike our single seater kayaks, the two seater does not have pedals and thus relies totally on paddling. Thanks to Tony Panayotou for paddling it out for a seaworthy trial.

Boating Safety: Refuelling

In Victoria, refuelling a recreational boat is governed by specific legal requirements to ensure safety and environmental protection.

Legal Requirements

- **No Passengers Onboard During Refuelling:** It is prohibited to refuel a vessel at a wharf, jetty, or pier if there are passengers onboard. Additionally, restarting the vessel with passengers onboard after refuelling is not allowed. An exception exists if disembarking passengers is impractical, such as when refuelling away from a wharf or jetty.
- Engine and Electrical Equipment Off: Before refuelling, turn off the engine and all electrical equipment to prevent ignition of fuel vapours.
- **Ventilation:** After refuelling, ventilate the tank and engine compartments thoroughly. Do not start the engine if fuel fumes are detected.
- **Avoid Overfilling:** Do not overfill the fuel tank. Clean up any spills immediately to prevent environmental harm and fire hazards.

Best Practices

- Secure Mooring: Ensure the vessel is securely moored during refuelling to prevent movement that could lead to spills.
- **No Smoking:** Smoking is strictly prohibited during refuelling operations.
- Use Proper Equipment: Utilise appropriate fuel containers and funnels to minimise spills.
- Regular Maintenance: Regularly inspect fuel lines and connections for wear and tear to prevent leaks.

Adhering to these regulations and best practices helps ensure safety for all onboard and protects the marine environment. Stay safe on the water.

History.

History Group member and journalist **Grant Aldous** investigated the early APYAC Minute Books to come up with a number of interesting snippets for Tight Lines. Many thanks to Grant for all of his work.

Far from being a dry account of monies spent, and motions forwarded and passed, the Minute Books offer a rich vein of insights into how the Club became what it is today. We will continue to share some of the



important (and also lighthearted) moments in our shared history in Tight Lines in the coming months.

#19 Dues and Registration

Dues for 2025 are not yet payable, but it's only a few months away. Even with Club membership at record levels, it's critical to keep membership dues up to date, just as it was in 1958. It seems that this has been an issue since forever, or at least for the past 70 years.

'In April 1958 a new membership rule was to be introduced - If dues not paid by 30 September membership lapses.'

'A member was told that unless he paid his dues immediately, he would forfeit trophies he had won.' (April 1958)

'Eighty one members to be told that unless their levies were paid, membership would be suspended.' (July 1958)



Victorian Fisheries Authority announces final workforce changes.



In February, the *Victorian Fisheries Authority* announced a proposed organisational reform that was instantly opposed by Victorian recreational fishers across social media and later confirmed via the VRFish <u>survey</u>. Two petitions each received more than 20,000 signatures calling for action to stop the proposal.

The Parliamentary Petition was recently tabled by **Sam Groth** (Shadow Minister for Outdoor Recreation). It's listed in the Order of Business to be considered when Parliament returns on Tuesday, 27 May.

Last week, the Victorian Fisheries Authority (VFA) confirmed that they will progress with workforce changes and their staff were notified of the final structure.

The role of a Fisheries Officer is set to change from being focused on enforcement to education and engagement. On the VFA website, they've stated that "The new structure reflects our continued commitment to protecting our fisheries while focusing more on education and engagement with the recreational fishing community"

The key changes include:

- A change in their staffing numbers from 192 to 157. This is a reduction of 35 filled roles, including 15 Fisheries Officers.
- The 16 vacancies will be abolished without replacement.
- This takes to total number of Fisheries Officers in Victoria from 73 to 39.
- Closure of Braeside and Altona stations.
- Stations at Cowes, Mornington and Queenscliff will remain, with four Fisheries Officers at each.
- Building stronger partnerships with external science providers to create efficiencies in science and management areas.
- Increasing their focus on targeting deliberate organised fisheries crime through a Major Fisheries Crime Unit with additional resources.

According to the VFA, things that will not be changed under the new structure:

- All Fisheries Officers will remain Authorised Officers, carry a badge, issue fines and carry out inspections.
- 13Fish remains open to report illegal fishing.
