

Next Fishing Charter

There is a Mixed Charter being run by Olga on Sunday 14th of December get in quickly as we are not sure how many places left.

Flatties

We are still proceeding with helping Latrobe University with their Flathead study.

Grab your kits in the Langdon Room, and downstairs near the sign-out book. Swabs are to be returned to the Esky in the boat house near the sign-out desk. Again: swab as many flathead as you can, size not important, make sure you return all undersize fish to the bay.

Flathead are on the in bite 2-8 metres of water. We believe a paternoster rig, sinker at the end of your line with one or two droppers above the sinker, is best. Start with a 4/0 or 5/0 hooks. Cut pilchards, squid or fillets of any fish are great bait, they will also take soft plastic lures. Drift over sandy areas from Black Rock to Port Melbourne. Once you catch a few go back over the area as Flathead do tend to school-up in waves on the bottom. Out the back of the club, 100 metres out further from the pier end can be productive.

The weather has been mixed for boaters and anglers it has been warmer during the day, some very strong northerlies and southerlies , heavy rain, then light winds, smooth seas and strong wind warnings, a complete mixed bag. The Bay water temperatures are still on the rise, only just, bay temperatures did actually cool for a brief time after the cold weather a couple of weeks ago. (16.3 C top end of the bay, 16.1 C Mid Bay, 14.8 C in the Ocean) We are looking for 16.5+C and the Snapper will go crazy, we hope. The Bay is now warmer than the ocean.

When you get bait from the Club can you please stop writing in hieroglyphics as my ancient Egyptian is not good when reconciling dockets! Please be sure you have enough credit on your fob when taking bait or you will get a call from the office.

Snapper

We went back through the records and the Bay is cooler at present than this time of year for the past five years. The *'Red Snapper Tide'* has started, although very patchy, but they are on. **Harry Tsoumbakos**, **Robert Pope**, **Richard Muscat**, **Rob Raffa**, **Stuart Cousins** his first snapper, **Grant Ahearn**, **Mark Mercieca**, **Pat**

Hutchinson, Bob Snell, Olga Harradine, Dan Karis, A. Hanson, A. McShanag, L.McGregor, Barry Hayes, Alex and Lee Spyrou and Mick Sass have all caught nice fish. Single or two fish being landed but not many 'bag outs' at all reported. Evening fishing the most productive.

Snapper are being caught in the Williamstown/Altona area and along the outside of the channel exclusion zones and around P2. Gem Pier Williamstown, Kerferd Road Pier at the club, Brighton Pier and Sandringham breakwater and Lagoon Pier have had some nice fish caught from around them. Fish from Princess Pier to Rickets Point and you may get lucky, all the marks around the club are looking good. Snapper prefer shallow water this time of year so fish close inshore 1.5 - 4 metres deep. Shallow water in mornings and nightfall, deeper water during the day. The 'warmies' has been producing good numbers of pinkies and the odd snapper up to 8kg —if you can find room to get a line in. Best baits everywhere are silver whiting, pilchards, squid, garfish, Australian salmon fillets and couta.

Please when you catch fish think about returning the ones you and your family do not need for food. Catch, take a pic and then return them asap in good condition.

Gummies

There are good size Gummy Sharks at many of the deep (12-20 metres) channels near the heads and deeper areas up our end, try P2. Stuart Cousins caught a ripper gummy 88 cm. just to prove me wrong in shallow water near St Kilda Harbour, seems fish and sharks do not follow the general rules. Best baits seem to be Silver Whiting, Australian Salmon Fillets, Pilchards, Garfish and Squid.

Whiting

Whiting have mostly been missing from the usual marks around the Club and other area reports are whiting fishing is on the improve. There are reports from that the very southern end of the Bay and St Leonards is producing some whiting. Fish grassy areas 2-5 metres deep and keep moving if you are not catching them. Best baits, Pipis, mussels and squid strips.

Squid

Whiting areas are also squid areas, and they are generally plentiful, so if chasing whiting keep a few squid jigs ready it may be well worth trying for them. Try Werribee, Point Cook and Campbell's Cove, Point Lonsdale, Sorrento and Blairgowrie. Look for clear water. Southern end of the Bay most productive.

Australian Salmon

Salmon are everywhere. Keep an eye out for birds working as there are even more giant schools of Australian Salmon up the Club end of the bay. Many good salmon caught around the red stick near Altona, a giant school reported out from Williamstown footy ground and near Kerferd Road Pier. Any smallish slivery or pilchard-looking lure dragged through or cast into the area the birds are diving-in should produce fish. Salmon make great bait for snapper. Snook also have been caught up our end of the Bay.

Garfish

Garfish are plentiful in the Bay so if you see them, a light rod with a quill, or similar float, and a small hook with Silverfish (very small almost clear fish about 1-2 cm long), Prawn slivers, or bread dough works. They are being caught off most piers as well.

Rug up, morning and evening temperatures still cold, check weather forecasts, keep an eye on the actual weather, do not take risks, give it a go and take care!

Boathouse Volunteers.

A special thank you to **Stuart Cousins**, a Coast Guard Skipper and our former Boat House Captain, who conducted a professional and very informative one-hour session on the application of CPR and the use of a Defibrillator. It was a great opportunity for the volunteers to ask questions and gain practical knowledge. Doing CPR properly is a very strenuous task, —for a moment we thought we'd have to apply it to a vigorous student! (Only kidding).

Thanks also to **Alex Spyrou** and **John Spragg** who are doing as Skippers on 'Seahawk', the new Club boat. Apart from conducting the early sea trials, Alex and John last weekend conducted skipper inductions for a few of us.





Reminders notes have been placed at each seaward door to remind boat users of the important tasks that must be completed.

EG385 will have the new flooring temporarily fitted-out, and the placement of the engine and other pieces of ancillary equipment placement need to be determined before the hull is turned-over for assessment, keel repair, and painting. The marine ply was cut to shape and fitted. A thoroughly professional job by **Colin**, **Bruce** and **Dave**.

PA25 has undergone repairs to the keel and split planks have been made. The voids between planks have been filled, and final sanding of the hull will take place, prior to timber treatment and painting / varnishing. The stainless steel keel strip has been temporally fitted, and is waiting for the rear wooden wedge section to be made prior to undercoating, sealing with *Sikaflex 291* and permanent fixing. PA005 has had the floor supports made and the Simplex engine painted and installed. The debate was to leave the engine painted

silver or paint it blue. Blue won out. Flooring will be cut and fitted and the wiring to the engine will commence.

The boat and kayak owners bait freezer has been cleaned out of ice bottles, plastic bags, loose bait, and unidentified containers. The freezer was becoming a problem because of the clutter in it.

Members may have noticed how refreshed the exterior steel mesh panels that border the stairs and ramps are. This is due to the efforts of **Tony P**. and **Mike K** who have de-rusted the panels and painted Zinc Gal onto them. There are still several panels to go. When finished the panels will certainly enhance the appearance of the building. It has been a great job undertaken by our two volunteers.

While waiting for more Zinc Gal to arrive our two volunteers haven't been idle. They have de-rusted and painted —with a metal finish— a steel crane-support section in the centre aisle. All supports will be done eventually.

We challenge you ...

Fish-shaped soy sauce bottles.

them into our bucket. In future, when it's near full we'll have a guessing competition.

Jet Ski Hoon Behaviour

Recognising and Reporting Jet Ski Hoon Behaviour in the APYAC Zone

Personal watercraft can be great fun when used responsibly, but unsafe jet ski behaviour is a real risk to swimmers, paddlers and boaters along the foreshore. Understanding the rules around the APYAC boating zone helps everyone stay safe on the water.

Know the Local Zone

APYAC has a designated **5-knot zone** extending for 200 metres straight out from the club.

Its boundaries are:

- Kerferd Road Jetty on the eastern (left) side
- The **yellow special mark** on the western (right) side, which delineates the 200m zone.

Outside those boundaries, the waters within 200 metres of the shoreline are **no-boating zones**. All vessels, including jet skis, must stay out of these areas entirely.

The 5-Knot Rule

Five knots is slower than most people think.

It's roughly:

- 9 km/h, or
- About the speed of a casual jog, and
- A vessel should produce minimal wake.

If a jet ski is throwing up spray, it's not doing 5 knots.

Prohibited Behaviour

Within 200 metres of the shoreline, jet skis are not permitted to perform "irregular manoeuvres", which include:

- Doughnuts
- Hard turns
- Rapid acceleration
- Weaving

What to Record

If you witness unsafe behaviour, the Water Police actively encourages reporting. Useful information includes:

- Photos or video, especially if the PWC registration number is visible



- Time, date and location
- Description of the vessel and rider
- Details of the behaviour observed

Always stay safe. Never place yourself in danger to capture footage.

Who to Call

For hoon behaviour or urgent concerns, contact:

- Water Police Directly: 1800 135 729
- Emergency Services: Call 000 and ask for Water Police

Early reporting helps keep the foreshore safe and enjoyable for all users.

I recently reported such behaviour to Water Police, who expressed their gratitude and intercepted three jet skis in front of APYAC.

Murray Cod Season Starts.

Victoria's Murray cod season opens on **Monday, 1 December**, and new data shows anglers can expect a healthy summer on the water. The latest **Native Fish Report Cards**, funded partly by recreational fishing licence fees and produced by the *Victorian Fisheries Authority (VFA)* with the *Arthur Rylah Institute*, provide an annual snapshot of the state's key cod fisheries.

Surveys across 10 waterways use electrofishing and fyke nets to assess fish numbers, legal-size proportions, and recent breeding activity. This year the **Ovens River** again leads the pack, recording

the highest fish abundance and a strong proportion of legal-sized cod within the 55–75 cm slot limit. Consistent natural breeding means stocking isn't required there.

The **Gunbower Creek** also showed excellent signs: its second-highest cod numbers since monitoring began and plenty of one- and two-year-old fish likely from the 192,000 stocked since 2022. The system's trophy status was further confirmed with a standout 113 cm, 26.7 kg cod recorded in this year's survey.

In the **Lindsay River**, cod appear to be bouncing back from the 2022 floods, with rising numbers of juveniles in a system already known for fast-growing fish. The **Goulburn River** also saw a slight uptick, with evidence of natural recruitment. VFA CEO **Travis Dowling** said the data helps guide stocking decisions and reflects the benefits of improved habitat, responsible angling, and effective size and bag limits.


